#### Welcome to our catalog!

Beaver Creek Greenhouses is a family owned specialty nursery located in the Selkirk Range of Southeastern British Columbia where, for the past fifteen years we have been growing a wide range of perennial plants. During the last five or so years we have narrowed our focus to concentrate on dwarf hardy plants suitable for growing in rock gardens and containers. Many of these plants are alpines - that is, low-growing perennials that grow near or above treeline in mountainous regions around the world. Others are dwarf plants adapted to the harsh climatic conditions found in the high steppes & drylands of the American West, Turkey & Central Asia, These wonderful compact hardy plants come in a dazzling array of foliage colors & types and many display rather large blooms, often quite out of proportion considering the small size of the plants. The foliage of many is also more or less evergreen. This is an important consideration as the foliage of garden plants is on display all year round (unless of course under snow!) while blooms are often fleeting. Few other groups of plants show such a rich diversity of foliage color, texture, shape and arrangment. The culture of alpines and rock garden plants has something to offer to all levels of gardeners, from easy to grow vigorous carpet plants smothered under brilliant springtime blooms to the choicest high alpine species that can challenge the skill of even the finest 'green thumb'.

We hope you will enjoy browsing through the listings that follow and that you find within some miniature plant gems to enhance your garden!

About our plants: all the plants we sell are grown here on our nursery. These plants are propagated by means of seed, cuttings & divisions from the large collection of stock plants maintained here at the nursery. In addition, we travel the West each summer collecting seed of native alpine and dryland plants for growing on at the nursery. Additional seed comes from exchanges with fellow nurserymen and seed collectors all over the world. Most of our mail order plants are propagated, over-wintered & shipped in 2 ¼" square x 3 ¼" deep 'rose' pots, a production method that ensures undisturbed root systems and plants ready to set out in the garden with a minimum of aftercare. The majority will be one year old though some slower growing items will be in their second year. Plants of especially fast-growing species may be less than one year old. All will be vigorous, well-rooted and ready to plant.

Website & E-mail updates: while this catalog contains all the plants that were available for shipping at the time of printing, many additional varieties do become available throughout the year. These we list in periodic updates to our website & e-mail catalogs, if you would like to receive these revised listings by e-mail please send your e-mail address and you will be placed on our automatic update list.

About the nursery: all our plants are sold by mail order only. We are sorry but due to limited space and staff, the nursery is not open for tours or on-site shopping. We thank you for your understanding! Minimum plant order is \$50.00 plus shipping & taxes.

Plants shipped to Canada & US only.

**Payment** must be received before orders are shipped - we accept money orders & cheques; no COD orders please. Orders can be placed by mail or email - addresses on cover & order form. Sorry but as we are a small nursery with limited staff, we cannot take orders by phone.

**US Orders** - all catalog prices in US funds; we pay all required phyto, inspection & brokerage fees then personally deliver plants to Northport, Wa for shipping via US carriers.

**SUBSTITUTIONS:** as we grow several thousand varieties, many items are available in limited quantities. To prevent delays and save on postage, we request your permission to ship substitutes for out of stock items. When permitted to do so, we will always provide items of equal or greater value to those originally ordered. Please include a list of acceptable substitutes with your order especially if you are ordering from the supplemental 'short supply' plant list that sometimes follows the main listings. If you would prefer not to have substitutes, we understand & will gladly issue a refund instead.

**WARRANTY:** your plants are carefully chosen and packed and are guaranteed to arrive in good condition - if they do not, please notify us within 5 days of receipt and replacement plants will be supplied. Such replacements will be made once only and are subject to a \$5.00 fee to help defray the extra shipping and handling expenses. We reserve the right to substitute for out of stock replacement plants. As we have no control over planting sites, cultural practices or climatic conditions - we can accept no responsibility for losses other than those incurred during shipment and reported to us within 5 days of arrival.

**Shipping Order** - orders are processed in the same sequence as received. We recommend early ordering - by doing so, you will ensure earliest delivery with fewest substitutions. If there is a period during which you **cannot** accept delivery **or** during which you would most **prefer** delivery, please indicate this date on the order form. We will try our best to accomodate your schedule but we cannot guarantee delivery on a specific date.

#### When your Shipment Arrives

**Unpacking Shipments** - it is very important to unpack all plants immediately upon arrival! Plants are packed in layers - make sure you check the entire carton. Most plants shipped in pots will have packing material wrapped around the crown; remove & discard this material & check soil moisture, watering any plants that are found to be dry. Place potted plants in a shady, protected area and water as required until you are ready to plant. Plants fresh from shipment are very sensitive to direct sun and drying winds, do make sure to protect newly unpacked plants from both! A few varieties may arrive as bare-root divisions, such plants should be transplanted as soon as possible. If these need to be held over, set plants temporarily in a bed of damp sand or moist peat moss in a shaded location and keep well watered. In general, we recommend planting out as soon as possible since potted or heeled-in plants require substantial care and attention.

Aftercare - after transplanting either type of plant, water in well and provide with light shade protection for up to a week depending on weather conditions. Most of our alpine and rock garden plants are grown with a layer of stone chips on the soil surface. This mulch serves to reduce weed growth but also ensures quick drainage around the crown of the plant thus reducing stem rots. After transplanting your plants into their permanent sites, we highly recommend you replace this surface mulch with a similar layer of stone chips, pea gravel, etc. While some varieties will bloom the first season, normal bloom size, color & timing should not be expected until the following year.

#### Key to Catalog Codes

**Inventory numbers** of each variety are followed by the botanical name with the genus initialized to save space. When ordering, it is very helpful if you include **both** the inventory number and plant name – many thanks.

**Height x width** measurements indicate the approximate mature size of the plant. These may vary considerably depending on growing conditions, climate zones and are intended as a general guide only. The height measurement generally includes that of flower stems - with many plants, the bulk of foliage will be well below this, a consideration to bear in mind when designing combinations with plants of varying heights.

Climate zone numbers refer to the coldest zone in which the plant will reliably winter over

planted outside without protection. Plant hardiness ratings undergo constant revision and should be used as a general guide only. Many factors enter into a plant's ability to withstand cold temperatures - soil drainage, snow cover, autumn weather, shelter from wind, microclimates - all these have some influence on hardiness. The adjacent chart defines climate zones according to the average lowest temperature reached in winter. While this is a good starting point for selecting suitable plants, it should be further refined by consulting experienced local gardeners and by taking into consideration the individual growing conditions unique to your site. In recent years, many gardeners have begun using containers to grow many specialty plants. In this way, plants can be moved into protected conditions for winter allowing a much wider range of plants to be grown than would be possible if planted directly outside.

**Sun Exposure** symbols indicate the plant's preferred location in terms of sun or shade. These exposure recommendations are based on moderate continental climate zones & may well require adjustment if you live in a warmer, drier climate like the American/Canadian West where many plants marked as preferring full sun may do better in light shade or if you live in in a mild coastal region where additional cloud cover & greater humidity means that plants marked here as preferring part shade may actually grow better in full sun.

 $\bigcirc$  - prefers or will tolerate a location in full sun

• - prefers half-day or filtered sunlight

• - prefers or will tolerate light shade all day & may tolerate dense shade (refer to individual descriptions)

**Origin** indicates the area of the world that each plant is originally from. This can be of much more than academic interest as knowing the area of origin can give the gardener valuable clues as to suitable growing conditions and potential hardiness. Plants marked as being of *garden origin* were selected or bred from cultivated plants rather than being introduced directly from the wild.

**ACIPHYLLA** - Spainard, Spear-grass **Apiaceae Family** 11038 A. monroi 4" x 6" Zone 6? O New Zealand \$5.00 Small tufts of sharp-tipped palm-like leaf clusters arising from a swollen base; short stiff stems bear compact clustered blooms of pale vellow in spring/early summer; a distinctive little alpine for its foliage effect & can be quite showy in bloom; like many of its kindred species, prefers a coolish site with peaty sandy soil; from wild seed - Mt. Sarkey, South Island, New Zealand,

11051 A. montana 4" x 6" Zone 6?  $\bigcirc$  New Zealand \$5.00 Another miniature Aciphylla from high elevation on New Zealand's South Island; compact tufts of slender leathery leaves with sharp tips; small clusters of yellow are borne in well-spaced spikes up the stiff stems; seldom on offer & our first listing of this little sweetheart.

#### **AETHIONEMA** - Stone Cress

**Brassicaceae Family** 

03503 A. armenum 4" x 6" Zone 3 () Armenia, Caucasus \$5.00 Low semi-woody bushlet with short stems bearing tiny blue needle-like leaves & small heads of bright pink blooms spring into summer; grown in suitably austere growing conditions, it will keep a neat compact habit - tighter than most others in this useful genus.

06216 A. glaucescens 3" x 6" Zone 3 O D Turkey \$5.00 Distinctive low shrublets with bright blue needle-like foliage; racemes of pink blooms for weeks in late spring-early summer; full sun/sharp drainage & loves lime.

- 07621 A. membranaceum 4" x 6" Zone 3  $\bigcirc$   $\bigcirc$  Turkey \$5.00 Unfortunately, the seed collector's complete description consists of 'compact plant'; as grown here though, has formed rather delicate low twiggy mounds of slim purple stems & fleshy blue-green foliage topped with small clusters of pink blooms; E.Anatolia, Turkey.
- **12916** A. schistosum 6" x 8" Zone 3 () *Turkev* \$5.00 Bushy purple-stemmed shrublet clothed in slim blue leaves & showy clusters of bright pink bloom through spring-early summer; lovely free-blooming plant for full sun & sharp drainage, also a fine tufa plant.

#### AGAVE -

**Agavaceae Family** 

14164 A. toumeyi ssp. bella 4" x 8" Zone 7 () Arizona \$6.00 Particularly attractive dwarf species of Agave with rosettes of low arching blue-grey leaves deeply toothed along the margins; native to crevices on rocky cliffs, Gila Co, Arizona.

12391 A. utahensis v. eborispina 8" x 12" Zone 7 O Nevada \$6.00 A small species of Agave native to the Southwestern US, this subspecies is found on a few mountain ranges in Southern Nevada; it forms compact rounded rosettes of blue leathery foliage with coarse ivory-colored teeth & a long terminal spine; after a substantial number of years, soaring slender but stiff flower stems can rise to 3' or more in height & bear yellow funnel-shaped blooms in late spring/early summer; from wild seed - 4000' elevation, Clark Co, Nevada.

**ALSTROEMERIA** - Peruvian Lilv

13009 A. revoluta F&W 10747 8" x 6" Zone 7? O Chile \$6.00 A small form of the species from the southern portion of its range in Chile; tufts of slender upright leaves arise from the fleshy rhizomes in early spring; these shoots die

away in late spring to be replaced by short upright fertile shoots bearing tight terminal clusters of pink blooms banded with yellow & speckled with red; from sandy sites in Chile's southern volcanic lowlands.

# ALYSSUM - Madwort. Basket of Gold

14894 A. bornmuelleri 2" x 6" Zone 3  $\bigcirc$  Turkey One of the smallest of all perennial Alyssum, this dwarf soft silver-grey cushion supports

a wealth of bright yellow bi-lobed blooms in early spring; easy to grow & long-lived if provided with the sharp drainage & rather poorish soil it is accustomed to in nature.

**00696** A. depressus 4" x 12" Zone 5  $\bigcirc$  Moroccan Atlas \$5.00 The low cushions are a soft grey filigree with finely divided hairy leaves borne on short spreading stems that arise from a central woody rootstalk; in late spring & on into summer, striking rose-red buds pop open to reveal large up-facing white daisies; these continue for weeks; a confirmed sunlover that thrives in sharply-drained sites not too rich in nutrients; a good plant for larger troughs or sand bed.

### **ANDROSACE** - Rock Jasmine

01631 A. jacquemontii 2" x 8" Zone 3 () Himalaya

**Primulaceae Family** \$5.00

Sometimes still listed as a variety of A. villosa, this variant is now generally considered sufficiently distinct to warrant species status; a vigorous grower, it produces wooly rosettes that form low spreading cushions via many short red stolons; deep purple-pink blooms are borne in spring with a smattering of rebloom continuing on into early summer; whether you accept the new name or prefer the old, this plant remains a splendid subject for every rock garden.

00321 A. lanuginosa 3" x 12" Zone 3 🔿 🕦 Himalaya \$5.00 Another Himalayan Rock Jasmine that should grace every rock garden; long silverygreen shoots spread into a low silky mat ideal to spill over & down the face of rockwork; dozens of short stiff stems arise in late spring/early summer & bear clustered bright pink fragrant blooms; easy, reliable and bone hardy.

09574 A. strigillosa JL 260601 3" x 4" Zone 3 () Nepal \$6.00 A robust species of Rock Jasmine from the Marsyandi Valley in Nepal; in its summer growth phase, it forms clumps of robust upright & spreading leaves; in winter, the plant shrinks back to a tight globular resting bud of tightly imbricate small hairy leaves surrounded by a ruff of the past season's spent foliage; in spring, tall stems arise bearing loose umbels of white bloom; while not seen as often as its close relatives. A. sarmentosa & studiosorum, it is quite easy to grow & usually produces a good crop of fertile seed which readily sprouts if allowed to drop around the parent plant.

**00859** A. studiosorum 'Chumbyi' 2" x 6" Zone 3  $\bigcirc$  ) N Himalaya \$5.00 A vigorous selection with spidery strawberry-like stems tipped with rosettes of greygreen leaves; clusters of fragrant deep pink blooms are golden-eyed; the foliage rosettes curl into tight balls & become densely coated with sparkling silver hairs in winter; a splendid alpine that should be in every rock garden.

#### **15203** A. villosa 2" x 6" Zone 3 () S Europe

\$6.00

A choice form of a variable species featuring small rounded rosettes densely swathed with long silken hairs; in cold weather, the foliage appears quite silver due to the density of this wooly coating; main flush of bloom begins in early spring followed by several smaller intermittent bursts of bloom extending into early summer; the white flowers are centred by a distinctive vellow eve which turns pink upon fertilization, best of all, this lovely pink tone often spreads to infuse the entire aging bloom with a soft rosy glow; easy to grow & well suited to trough, tufa or raised bed.

08454 A. villosa v. taurica 2" x 6" Zone 3 () Crimea Distinctive form of this popular species; in this variant, the leaves are quite slender & sharply pointed giving an almost Saxifraga-like appearance to the rosettes; clustered white blooms feature a red eye on pollination - as the flowers age, this rich stain can spread & suffuse the entire bloom.

**ANEMONE** - Windflower

13827 A. rivularis CC4588 16" x 18" Zone 4 () • Himalava

Vigorous windflower with large white blooms painted purple blue on the backside of the petals; from semi-shaded sites on the verges of forest clearings in Nepal.

**ANTENNARIA** - Pussy-Toes

03640 A. dioica 'Nyewood' 3" x 12" Zone 3 () Garden selection \$5.00 Low mats of matte green foliage, each leaf margin decoratively trimmed with silver hairs; bright pink pom-poms of bloom arise in late spring & continue into early summer; easy to grow, spreads quickly & always maintains its neat & tidy appearance - a fine all round rock garden plant & in terms of showy bloom, the best of its genus.

#### **ANTIRRHINUM** - Hardy Snapdragon

13491 A. pulverulentum 3" x 12" Zone 3 O Spain \$5.00 A small perennial Snapdragon from the limestones of NE Spain forming low mats of soft grey-green foliage & bearing creamy blooms with bright vellow throats; pretty much a non-stop bloomer throughout late spring & summer; excellent spreading plant for spilling over rock work or retaining walls.

09533 A. chrvsantha (new ssp.) 12" x 8" Zone 4  $\bigcirc$  New Mexico \$5.00 Possibly a new subspecies of the splendid Southwestern species, this new collection from New Mexico is an especially compact variant but features the same large bright yellow blooms with long spurs sailing out behind; same attractive blue-green foliage too.

**05547** A. olympica 18" x 12" Zone 3 O ① Caucasus \$4.00 An attractive taller species of Columbine native to alpine meadows in the Russian Caucasus; features waxy blue-green leaves & strong stems bearing large sky blue blooms that are often strikingly bicolored with darker-colored sepals & paler spurs; suitable for well-drained border soils or along the verges of the rock garden.

#### **ARENARIA** - Sandwort

**Carvophyllaceae Family** 

13838 A. festucoides CC4626 3" x 6" Zone 3 O W Himalaya \$5.00 Tight flattened spiralled cushions of sharply-tipped bristle-like leaves is not the form one usually associates with Himalayan alpines but here it is anyways; wiry stems arise in summer & bear small clusters of sizeable white blooms; a notable feature is the fresh bright green color of the summer foliage; the nice dwarf habit makes it suitable for trough culture but it seems quite vigorous enough for general rock garden use.

14165 A. hookeri v. desertorum 2" x 6" Zone 3 O W USA

With an incredibly dense pin-cushion habit, this is a true western gem; very slow growing, it makes a great trough & container plant; has a wide distribution in the American West & is always a delight to come across in the field; in late spring/early summer short wiry stems bear many clustered white blooms just above the deep green cushion; from wild seed - Utah.

### **ARISAEMA** -

#### 04550 A. consanguineum 24" x 18" Zone 7 () China

Large aroid from Yunnan with bold foliage divided into many slender segments; long green spathe with a white-striped hood above.

#### **ARISARUM** -

**Araceae Family** 14378 A. proboscideum 4" x 12" Zone 4 () Italy/Spain \$5.00

A very cute little Aroid from the Apennines of Italy & a small area of SE Spain; forms spreading colonies of short upright sheaves of foliage that conceal beneath their dense miniature canopy exotic white & brown jug-shaped blooms with improbably long maroon tails; spreads quickly in suitable lightly-shaded humusy sites; makes a great container plant in colder zones; the kids will be fascinated by these curious flowers.

#### ASARUM - Wild Ginger

#### **08151** A. marmoratum **3**" x **8**" Zone 4 () • Oregon

Lovely mottled leaves are splashed with silver markings & veination; large purple/brown upfacing blooms open in spring but are largely hidden beneath the newly expanding foliage; an elegant & distinctive small scale ground cover for shady sites.

#### **ASTER** -

#### **09919** A. alpinus v. dolomiticus 6" x 6" Zone 3 $\bigcirc$ Italv \$5.00 A compact new introduction from Mt. Baldo in Italy, forms low tufts of deep green foliage & bears large lavender-blue asters in mid-summer; easy to grow in any sunny, well-drained spot.

#### **AZORELLA** -

#### 10423 A. trifurcata 'Nana' 2" x 8" Zone 3 O Patagonia \$5.00 Low hard mats of glossy tripartite leathery leaves; slow-growing foliage plant that will eventually form domed cushions; in nature, these can span a meter or more & with age become so imbricated & hard, they can withstand the weight of clumsy plant hunters without apparent damage.

#### **BETULA** - Birch

#### **12805 B. apoiensis 30" x 36" Zone 3** () *Japan*

A compact shrub Birch for the verges of the rock garden or bonsai purposes; forms twiggy rounded shrubs with bronze-brown young twigs & attractive small toothed leaves: good yellow autumn color; a very rare species in the wild growing only on several mountain ridges of Mt. Apoi on Hokkaido, Northern Japan.

**09619 B. pumila 5' x 5' Zone 3**  $\bigcirc$  Newfoundland

Native dwarf Birch from Newfoundland; small rounded finely-toothed leaves on short multi-stemmed shrubby plants; hardy as a moose & thrives on dampish sites - even boggy ground is not too wet.

00084 B. striata 12" x 8" Zone 4 O ) China \$5.00 Upright sheaves of olive-green foliage are followed by stems bearing large bright rosypink orchids; long-lasting blooms continue for weeks in late spring & on into summer; among the hardiest of the ground orchids from China, these will winter down to Zone 4 with a thick mulch of leaves; slow to come up in spring so it nicely misses late frosts; superb plant for lightly shaded woodland gardens.

Choice Chinese hardy ground orchid with habit & culture as for the pink form but in this less common variant, the blooms are white though in some conditions/seasons can also be attractively flushed with tints of pink or lavender.

02805 B. tymphaea (in as B. baldacci) 6" x 6" Zone 3  $\bigcirc$  Balkans \$5.00 A new plant for us, about all we can tell you is that it has typical white Crucifer fourpetalled blooms in spring; the habit is loosely cushion-forming & the striking foliage has a nice solid texture & soft silver sheen to it indicating a probable preference for full sun exposure; I would suspect that with its geographic origins & family ties, it will likely do best in limey well-drained sites with a rather poorish soil; the members of the recent MESE expedition to Greece spoke glowingly of this compact subshrub & we are pleased to be able to offer it to you.

#### **BOUVARDIA** -

**15289 B. ternifolia 48" x 36" Zone 7** O SW USA

Very showy woody subshrub native to lightly shaded sites in SW USA; forms an open upright bush with tapered leathery stiff leaves & bears terminal clusters of beautiful scarlet red tubular blooms with flaring lobes; very attractive to hummingbirds; from wild seed - desert areas, Jeff Davis County, Texas.

**BUXUS** - Boxwood

The largest of the Mountain Mahogany & often forming extensive pure stands on dry slopes - these 'pygmy forests' are a distinctive feature across much of the American West & can present a real challenge if you are trying to get through to the other side!; sometimes grows in a shrub form, sometimes as a small contorted tree but always with a multitude of sharp stiff stems & dense growth habit; leaves are dark green, resinous & have the margins curled under; bark on older stems & main trunk is furrowed; grows well in containers & given the gnarled, twisted miniature trees seen across the West should have great bonsai potential; from wild seed - Trinity Co, California.

Small autumn-flowering species from SW Turkey with distinctive near round dentate leaves; young leaves often display a red flush, mature leaves generally show some silver patterning; blooms are pale pink with a distinct magenta blotch at the base of each petal; quite hardy & well worth trying outdoors in a lightly shaded site.



03527 D. sp. aff. sphaeroides 2" x 6" Zone 3 O I W North America \$5.00 One of my favorite Draba, wish I was certain of its identity!: attractive long needle-thin leaves radiate outwards like miniature green sea urchins; slowly builds to form rounded domes; thin stems poke outwards carrying clusters of bright yellow blooms in early spring; try this one - it is quite distinct & well worth having.

**DRACOCEPHALUM** - Dragon-head Lamiaceae Family 13758 D. aff. densum 1" x 4" Zone 3  $\bigcirc$  Tadjikistan \$6.00 Small flat mats of delicate pinnate leaves & violet blooms terminating short ascending stems; compact enough for trough work; choice high alpine Dragon's Head from rocky slopes in Tadjikistan, Central Asia. 15006 D. aucherii 2" x 8" Zone 3 () 1ran \$6.00

A choice new introduction from volcanic screes in the Elburz Mts. of Iran: the pale grevgreen toothed aromatic foliage is coated with fine hairs & is borne on low spreading stems that twist this way & that; in late spring, each leaf axil bears a rich blue hooded bloom typical of these 'Dragonheads'; should do well in a well-drained but not parched site - we've found in the past that while these elite high elevation Dracos need good drainage around the crown, they are easily weakened by drought & prefer a steady supply of moisture at the root.

Bearing the rather evocative common name of 'The Horse Crippler', this cactus is a low mound-forming species bearing wickedly long bone stiff spines that recurve sharply downwards along the crinkled vertical ribs; very attractive in the field I imagine if spotted before setting foot on it lurking half-hidden in the dry grass; this collection from the Culebra Bluffs in Eddy County, New Mexico is described by the seed merchant as the 'long-spined cliff form'; the showy blooms are deep pink to red in the center fading to light pink on the outer petal edges & are borne in a ring near the center of the dome; the resulting fruits are bright red & can reach the size of pullet eggs on mature plants so their ornamental value is considerable; sadly even though this collection is from the more northern extension of the species range, it is unlikely to prove winter hardy in areas with really cold winters so perhaps best kept captive as a container plant - your neighbour's horses will thank you.

#### **ECHINOCEREUS** -

#### 12451 E. coccineus 6" x 12" Zone 5 O New Mexico

The famed 'Scarlet Hedgehog' cactus; forms low multi-head clumps of short upright deeply-corrugated stems; white spines bear dark tips; around the top of the stems large

buds break out & open into great cups of rich red - a stunning color & a floral show almost unmatched in the world of rock gardening; this collection from 4900' elevation, Sierra Co. New Mexico.

**12631 E. coccineus SB243 8" x 12" Zone 5** *O New Mexico* \$6.00 This unusual form of the Scarlet Hedgehog bears large showy blooms of deep pink; deeply corrugated upright cylinders of deep green bear long slender pale vellow spines; hardy to around -20C; from Otero Co, New Mexico.

- 12632 E. coccineus v. gurneyi SB351 6" x 12" Zone 5 O New Mexico \$6.00 A compact selection of this exquisite scarlet-flowered hedgehog cactus; forms small mounds of squat stems bearing few but formidable sharp stiff spines that are orange-tan at the base & deepen to dark brown at the tips; the aereoles at the base of the spines are distinctive pads of dense white wool; this collection from Lincoln Co, New Mexico.
- 12636 E. engelmannii v. variegatus SB481 5" x 3" Zone 5 O Arizona \$6.00 This is the smallest of the many variants of Echinocereus engelmannii & forms low clusters of four to six small cylinders; these stems are densely spined with long centrals that in this collection are red; the radial spines as well as the base of the centrals is much lighter in coloration & provide the distinctive variegation alluded to in the varietal name; lovely cups of rich magenta or satiny purple are borne atop the clusters in spring; this collection from the Houserock Valley which skirts the northern rim of the Grand Canyon, Northern Arizona.
- 12452 E. fendleri 6" x 2" Zone 5 O New Mexico A small hedgehog cactus forming clusters of cylindrical ribbed stems that are easily seen through the somewhat open spination consisting of long central spines coloured pink & brown surrounded by an array of shorter white radial spines; in this collection from Luna County in southern New Mexico, the beautiful blooms are particularly large reaching over 3" in diameter & richly-colored in red-violet.
- **12637 E. fendleri DJF1367 6" x 2" Zone 5** O New Mexico \$6.00 A collection of the species from the easternmost part of its range in Guadalupe County of east-central New Mexico; the slender upright cylinders of this David Ferguson collection features distinctive spination with the single long central spine & its surrounding 5 or 6 radial spines all pure white - together they form a starburst type effect perching atop the long extended tubercules; flower color was not supplied by the seed vendor but typically the showy cups of this species are vivid rose-purple to magenta.
- 12640 E. fendleri v. kuenzleri SB353 6" x 2" Zone 5 O New Mexico \$6.00 The most distinctive of the E. fendleri complex, this striking small hedgehog lacks the long central spine that is normally the distinguishing feature of the species; also, its flattened radial spines are few in number, unusually heavy & corky in texture & this along with their white coloration & starry incurving arrangement presents a striking contrast with the deep green of the cylindrical stems; in spring, mature stems bear large beautiful rosy-purple blooms centred with a large boss of golden stamens. Sorry but we cannot ship this plant to the United States.

12641 E. fendleri v. rectispinus GL528 6" x 2" Zone 5 O New Mexico \$6.00 In this desirable variant of E. fendleri, the formidable solitary central spines are dark brown, distinctively long & stand out at a rigid right angle to the upright cylindrical stems; in contrast, surrounding the base of each central spine is a rosette of short white radial spines laid out flat against the ribs; large upright purple-pink blooms open in spring around the top of mature stems & are followed by bright red fruits; this collection from the area of Truth or Consequences, New Mexico.

**12642 E. nicholii RP73 8" x 12" Zone 6** () Arizona \$6.00 A beautiful clustering hedgehog cactus from the Silver Bell Mts. of Arizona; the tall stems are densely covered with long bright vellow spines making this one of the most eve-catching members of the genus; lavender funnel-shaped blooms open here & there

over the top half of each stem; the resulting green fruit turn bright red once mature & are sweet & edible.

- 12455 E. reichenbachii 4" x 6" Zone 5  $\bigcirc$  Texas \$6.00 One of the most beautiful species of all winter-hardy American Cactus; in this longblooming form the blooms are a deep rich pink; this small upright barrel cactus initially forms a solitary stem but will eventually branch to form clusters; a distinctive starburst of short white spines line each spiralling rib.
- 12643 E. reichenbachii v. albispinus 3" x 4" Zone 4 O Oklahoma \$6.00 Very attractive small barrel cactus with a distinctive precise spiralling pattern of dense white spines; purple-pink blooms are borne in spring.
- 12456 E. reichenbachii v. albispinus 3" x 4" Zone 4 O Oklahoma \$6.00 Another collection of this super small barrel cactus that is coated with a distinctive spiralling pattern of dense white spines; fuchsia-pink blooms are borne in spring; from Troy Co, Oklahoma.
- 12644 E. reichenbachii v. bailevi 4" x 3" Zone 4  $\bigcirc$  Oklahoma \$6.00 Beautiful miniature barrel cactus from Oklahoma with mature spines tinted orange/pink & bearing huge vivid purple-pink blooms in spring atop the short ribbed cylinders.
- 12645 E. reichenbachii v. caespitosus 3" x 4" Zone 4 O Oklahoma \$6.00 Choice compact clustering form of E. reichenbachii with small rounded barrels knit with a dense interlocking armature of white spines hence its common name of 'white lace cactus'; spines are shorter than in the otherwise very similar E. reichenbachii y. albispinus but if possible, are arranged in an even more beautiful mathematically perfect spiral pattern; this collection from Johnston Co, Oklahoma bears lovely pink blooms in spring.
- 12646 E. reichenbachii v. perbellus 4" x 3" Zone 4 O Oklahoma \$6.00 At maturity, the short pure white spines are tipped with black hence the common name of 'Black Lace' Cactus; large purple-pink blooms in spring top the short upright barrels; these plants from stock originally collected near Belva, Oklahoma.
- **12647 E. russanthus 6" x 2" Zone 7?** O Texas/New Mexico \$6.00 A small Hedgehog cactus from the Big Bend area of Texas & adjacent SE New Mexico; the upright cylinders are very densely arrayed with distinctive red-brown spines which give the plants an overall shaggy appearance & ruddy hue; each aerole sports multiple central spines - these are matched in color but exceeded in number by dozens of wire thin radial spines; the rich deep red blooms tend to appear on the sides of the stems & form funnels that often do not open fully - perhaps prevented in part by the density of the spines.
- 12648 E. triglochidiatus v. mojavensis 6" x 12" Zone 4 O SW USA \$6.00 A freely-offsetting hedgehog Cactus that slowly makes low mounds of tightly-packed cylindrical stems; the web of interlacing curving slender white spines make a good foliage feature; gorgeous rich red funnel-shaped blooms stay open day & night & can last for several days if weather is cool; hardy, free-flowering & with a desirable dwarf mounding habit - an altogether top notch plant for the modern rock garden.
- 12649 E. triglochidiatus v. mojavensis f. inermis SB686 6" x 12" Zone 4 🔿 \$6.00 This choice clustering hedgehog cactus can reach a substantial size in nature - not in height but rather in width as the many stems crowd together to form large cushions; much slower-growing in cultivation & it can take many years to form a cushion exceeding 8" in diameter; the bright red flowers in spring are very showy & individual blooms can last for several days before fading; though variable, this unusual form of the species generally features stems with relatively few weak spines & those present tend to be concentrated near the bottom of the stems; the upper tubercules of the stems are free of spines & tipped with attractive dense white wooly aereoles; a hardy collection from the northernmost part of its range - Mesa County, Colorado.

O New Mexico \$6.00 Known as the Organ Mountain Foxtail Cactus, this rare little fellow has a restricted distribution & is found only at substantial elevations in the Organ Mts. of Dona Ana County, New Mexico; there it forms small clumps of slender upright cylinders; in this collection, the dense coat of spines matures to brown - normally the species bears yellow spination; in spring, small pink flowers pop open atop each stem.

Mongolia & that the plants were about 10" tall; so far here it has formed neat trim little tufts of slender foliage; should prove bone hardy but we'll have to wait & see on flower color.

**12413** I. sp. 16" x 12" Zone 3  $\bigcirc$  Tibet \$5.00 This is a rare collection from Tibet which has not flowered for us yet; so far has produced vigorous tufts of slender mid-green leaves; from wild seed - 3400m elevation, Pasom Tso, Tibet.

- 04554 I. sp. aff. chrysographes ARGS00#625 30" x 12" Zone 3 O Yunnan \$5.00 Another tall species Iris collected by the Alaskan Rock Garden Society in Yunnan in 2000; this collection gathered as seed at 3450m on Little Snow Mountain; bears several blooms per stem in mid-spring; the large flowers are rich blue with a distinct purple blotch & yellow/white marbling at the base of the falls.
- 05457 I. spuria v. notha 30" x 12" Zone 3 O Russia, Kashmir \$5.00 Tall clumps of elegant slender arching foliage & large violet-blue blooms; good species for damp sites in full sun; from wild seed - Kashmir.

# 12680 M. grahamii SB1860 3" x 3" Zone 7 O New Mexico

A squat cylindrical fish-hook Cactus that ranges from Arizona through to West Texas; often hard to find in nature as they tend to grow in the shelter of overhead shrubs or tucked well down in rock crevices, the short barrels are very pale green & covered with a solid armature of long rich brown central spines, the longest of these bearing a sharply

recurved tip; surrounding the cluster of centrals is a starburst of spreading white radial spines; light pink blooms are borne after summer rainfalls, these are carried in a ring around the upper portion of the stem & often feature a wide dark rose-pink mid-stripe that can give the blooms a striking bicolored effect; showy bright red club-shaped fruit follow; this collection from Steins, a well-known ghost town in extreme SW New Mexico.

- 12681 M. heyderi v. bullingtoniana SB487 2" x 4" Zone 6? O New Mexico \$6.00 A low flattened single-stemmed pincushion cactus from SW New Mexico & adjacent Arizona, this collection is from the dry Jarilla Mts. of New Mexico; the relatively few short spines do not obscure the beautiful pattern of spiralling tubercules; flowers are borne in rings just below the top of the low dome & large decorative red fruits follow the blooms; unfortunately I do not know the flower color on this specific collection yet but in other areas, the species blooms in various shades of cream & pink.
- **12474 M. meiacantha 2" x 4" Zone 6**  $\bigcirc$  New Mexico \$6.00 A ground-hugging fish-hook cactus with a flattened globular shape - the above ground portion of the stem often assumes a low domed habit making it hard to find in the field; the pronounced tubercules are an odd angular shape & this can easily be seen as the spination is rather sparse & short consisting of white radial spines & a single brown central; damaged stems exude a sticky white latex; pink blooms often feature a darker midstripe & open in spring to be followed by purple-red club-shaped fruits; this
- collection from Eddy County, SE New Mexico. 12682 M. meiacantha RP89 2" x 4" Zone 6 O New Mexico \$6.00 Another collection, this time from the Watrous-Ft. Union area of North-eastern New Mexico; flowers in this form bear a distinctive pink midstripe.
- 12683 M. meridiorosei DC531 4" x 3" Zone 6? O New Mexico \$6.00 A very attractive small cactus that forms clusters of somewhat flattened ball-shaped stems with a peculiar blue-green tint; each tubercle bears small tufts of long stiff central spines with tips so strongly recurved they earn the plant the common name of 'fishhook' cactus; the rich brown of these central spines makes a nice contrast to the collar of white radial spines that surrounds them; this free-flowering species blooms young & bears many rich rosy-purple blooms around the apex of the cylinder in summer; this collection from the Peloncinno Mts, New Mexico. \$6.00
- 12684 M. prolifera 3" x 6" Zone 7? O Texas

A low clustering cactus that ranges from SW Texas down into Mexico along the Gulf of Mexico - this collection from Pecos County in west Texas; this little fellow has an almost hairy appearance due to the extremely fine & numerous radial spines that clothe each small egg-shaped stem; as the species name suggests, offsets are very freely produced & even young plants soon build into low mounds comprised of many tightly packed stems; flowers are small & borne near the top of older stems & are usually creamy-yellow though with pink tones & usually with a darker midstripe; decorative cylindrical clubshaped bright red fruits follow the bloom.

12686 M. wrightii SB86 3" x 3" Zone 5 O New Mexico \$6.00 An elegant small ball cactus consisting of a single flattened blue-green globular stem that is well armoured with long fishhook-shaped rich brown central spines projecting from each slender tubercle; gorgeous large bright pink-purple blooms pop open atop the globe in late spring/summer; these starry flowers mature to form purplish edible fruits that are comically large for the size of the tiny cactus that bears them: this collection from near the northernmost extension of the species range, the Manzano Mts of North Central New Mexico

#### 04122 M. alpinus 8" x 12" Zone 7 O New Zealand

A very odd member of the Violet Family; forms low spreading bushlets of leathery flattened stems with a few small fleshy leaves spotted here & there along the blunted spine-tipped branches; young plants have variable foliage color ranging from deep green in summer to rich plum in autumn & approaching purple/black in winter; blooms we haven't seen vet but they are small white cups borne in summer & mature into small white or pale blue berries that hang all along the branches; not likely very hardy in North American conditions but for collectors of alpine oddities, this most unlikely 'Violet' will certainly have appeal.

Southern California.

**10354** M. spinosa **15" x 12"** Zone 4  $\bigcirc$  Turkev

A showy choice thistle-like plant with short stiff upright stems clothed with paired spiny leaves & bearing short interrupted spikes of bloom; the whorled gaping flowers are large & colored yellow & red; wants a site in full hot sun & a rather poorish, lime-rich sharplydrained soil; from wild seed - Bolkar Dag, Turkey.

**NOTHOFAGUS** - Southern Beech **Fagaceae Family** 10399 N. antarctica 'Prostrata' 12" x 24" Zone 7 O O S. America \$8.00 Small contorted Antarctic Beech from South America; zigzagging spreading branchlets fan out horizontally & bear small elegantly toothed Beech leaves in miniature; would probably eventually reach some considerable spread if not vertical size in the ground but it is quite slow growing & this makes it ideal for container culture; a gem!

#### **OPHIOPOGON** - Lilv Turf

02353 O. planiscapus 'Nigrescens' 12" x 18" Zone 4 () Japan \$5.00 Slow spreading clumps of darkest green, very near black, thick leathery striated grassy foliage: clusters of pink-tinted white blooms summer into autumn; under good growing conditions produces blue-black berries; choice foliage plant for containers or lightlyshaded borders; simply nothing else like it.

**Morinaceae Family** \$6.00 carelessly only once!; gorgeous large pink bowl-shaped blooms open along the pad margins in late spring; from Silver Peak, Nevada.

14323 O. basilaris v. treleasei 10" x 18" Zone 6 O California \$6.00 Beautiful red-flowered form of the species from Kern County in California; forms jumbled masses of flattened stem segments that, unlike the other varieties of the species which are spineless, feature a good armor of sharp spines. Sorry but we cannot ship this plant to the United States.

06660 O. clavata 3" x 12" Zone 6 O New Mexico \$6.00 An unusual low-growing Opuntia endemic to drainages of the Rio Grande River in New Mexico; forming silver-grey mats of small club-shaped pads, it is well armed with older joints bearing conspicuously thick down-facing white dagger-like spines; yellow flowers are borne in late spring/early summer & are followed by yellow fruits; this collection

12986 O. fragilis 'Bronze Beauty' 3" x 6" Zone 3 O

Tubby little cylindrical joints, free of spines, build to form small clumps like jumbled piles of deep green swollen sausages; in winter, the joints take on a deep bronzy hue; once the plant is of suitable age, diaphanous lemon yellow blooms can be expected in spring; while the lack of obvious spines may invite careless handling, this choice dwarf Opuntia does not lack defences as the rusty-red hair fine glochids detach easily & can be very irritating; nonetheless, while I usually avoid Opuntia, I wouldn't want to be without this cute little winter-hardy cactus.

#### **OREOBOLUS** -

**Cyperaceae Family** 

11040 O. pectinatus 2" x 4" Zone 6? O New Zealand \$5.00 A miniature sedge from New Zealand with slender leaves forming two ranks on very short stems; slowly forms dense rounded cushions; in its native habitat it inhabits alpine bogs so in cultivation, likely best grown in peaty soils that never dry out; from wild seed - Remarkable Range, NZ.

#### **ORIGANUM** - Oregano

**14836 O. dictamnus 6" x 12" Zone 7**  $\bigcirc$  *Crete* 

from Socorro County, Central New Mexico.

'Dittany of Crete'; the well-known ornamental oregano with wooly grey-green round leaves set in pairs along trailing stems; bright rose-pink blooms are profusely borne from summer well into autumn & being papery, remain effective for many months; while not fully hardy, this lovely plant richly deserves a space indoors or the protected frame space needed to overwinter in colder zones.

#### **OROSTACHYS** -

**14591 O. boehmeri 3'' x 6'' Zone 3** () Japan

Japanese succulent species forming mats of fleshy green rosettes surrounded by a mass of smaller offsets that arise out of the older stems; tall broad spires of bloom form in late autumn & feature beautiful white blooms with contrasting red anthers; these open quite late in the season & can be damaged by early hard frosts so if you have a greenhouse, make sure to grow this plant as a potted specimen & take it in to enjoy the full spectacle of its bloom cycle (you can always have your cake & eat it too by rooting a stem or two & planting them outside, cuttings root quickly & without difficulty!).

**14586 O. fimbriatus 3'' x 6'' Zone 3** (*N Asia*) \$5.00 Small fleshy rosette-forming succulent from North Asia; the leaves are triangular in cross-section & taper to a point & form an attractive flattened star-shape; young leaves are pale blue-green but as they age they are suffused with rich purple-red tones; in late fall, a tall spike arises from mature rosettes & bears a packed column of white blooms

with protruding stamens creating a foxtail-like effect; hardy & drought-tolerant succulent for every rock garden.

- 14594 O. hybrid yellow, ES 2" x 6" Zone 3 () \$5.00 We have very little information yet on this hybrid as it has not yet bloomed for us; so far it has formed low sprawling mats of fleshy pale green leaves with many offsets forming from the base of the short sprawling stems; the new young leaves have a lovely bluegreen hue.
- **14584 O. 'Jade Mountain' 2" x 6" Zone 3**  $\bigcirc$

Very pale icv blue-green succulent foliage forming low mats; many small rosettes & offsets arise from short spreading stems.

**14590 O. limuloides - green form 3" x 6" Zone 3 O** *China/Mongolia* \$5.00 A small Sempervivum-like succulent with rosettes of pale green fleshy keeled leaves each bearing a soft distinctive 'spike' at the tip; new small rosettes form on short stems around the parent plant; the main rosette elongates in late summer & produces an upright stem carrying a lovely cylinder of spidery white Sedum-like blooms in autumn. \$5.00

14583 O. 'Pink' 2" x 5" Zone 3 ()

Hardy succulent with low rosettes of fleshy oval leaves colored an appealing pale sage green; new plantlets are freely formed & soon form a spidery colony of offsets rising from offsets; in autumn, erect stems rise to 4" or so in height & bear attractive starry pink blooms whose long protruding stamens create a 'foxtail' effect; full sun, good drainage & a poorish soil are the basic requirements.

At first glance, resembles a particularly refined Sempervivum; on closer inspection the two distinct leaf types reveal the mistaken impression - like some metallic daisy flower, an outer ring of longer sharp-tipped leaves surround the inner tightly concentric array of small flattened leaves: the resulting textural effect is very pleasing indeed; the bloom spike bearing small creamy white blooms arises out of the middle of the rosette & seems to expand upward like one of those intricately woven chinese finger puzzles; from wild seed - alpine steppe, Altai Mts, Russia.

We collected seed of this small dryland Viola in the Oldman River Valley in Southern Alberta; there it colonized narrow fissures & crevices in weathered sandstone outcrops hardly the environment one usually associates with Violets, especially northern species but it was fresh & rich green even in mid-summer so obviously it was finding moisture well below the arid surface of the rock; we haven't seen the blooms so cannot comment on color but we think it a worthwhile native for trial in trough or crevice.

# VITIS - Grave

04962 V. vinifera 'Purpurea' 10' x 12' Zone 4  $\bigcirc$  ) Garden selection \$6.00 This selected form of the ancient European wine grape features silvery-green new leaves which soon develop rich red tints & deepen to burgundy by summer; the onset of cold weather in autumn brings out the final color phase - a fiery crimson to end the season; a beautiful vigorous vine for covering screens, arbors, even stout trees & one that offers a special bonus in the form of small but very sweet black grapes. Sorry but we cannot ship Vitis to the United States.

Vitaceae Family

**14190** Y. aff. nana 8" x 8" Zone 5 O Utah Even smaller than the dollhouse Yucca, Y. harrimanniae, this newly described miniature species forms spiky tufts of grey-green waxy foliage; after a period of years building its strength, it produces a tall flower stem bearing large outfacing cup-shaped blooms; as one would expect, very drought tolerant once established.

**12542** Y. kanabensis 18" x 24" Zone 5? O Utah \$5.00 Slender leathery leaves & large cream flowers.

12543 Y. schidigera 36" x 36" Zone 7? O California \$5.00 A large arborescent ('tree-like' - develops a main stem) species from California; tender specimen plant with long leathery leaves & impressive stems of large white or cream flowers.

**12544** Y. torreyi 6' x 6' Zone 6? O Texas \$5.00 Imposing rounded clumps of sharp upwards-pointing leathery leaves & eventually, tall

stems bearing dense spikes of large cream-white blooms.

#### **Glossary of Horticultural Terms**

**alpines** - in garden terms, these are compact plants that are often but not always from mountainous areas of the world. As a rule, they are slow-growing with low, dense growth habits and prefer excellent drainage, sunny exposures and poorish soil. Such conditions are most easily provided in a rock garden setting or in alpine troughs.

**alpine house** - greenhouses fitted with extra vents that allow free air flow, used to give extra protection to tender alpines, keep rain off dryland species which need periods of drought or protect plants whose foliage or blooms would be spoiled by severe weather.

**alpine tundra** - tight foliage mat formed largely of mosses, lichens, sedge and various flowering plants; typical of high arctic and alpine zones above treeline; plants are naturally dwarfed by incessant winds, bitter cold and short growing season.

**biennial** - plants that generally produce foliage the first year, then bloom and die the second, most produce large seed crops and many will self-sow to form perennial colonies.

**bog** - an area around a garden pool or natural water body that stays constantly moist because of seepage. Surface water may or may not be present. Such areas should be incorporated into every garden pool design as they permit the culture of many otherwise difficult plants. They can also make home water gardens appear less artificial as most natural water bodies are bordered by such wetland areas.

**bonsai** - for our purposes, small shrubs or trees trained by man or naturally dwarfed by harsh growing conditions to form gnarled shapes reminiscent of ancient trees.

**border** - basically a flower bed at ground level intended for perennial plants. Many rock garden plants make excellent low edgings for such beds.

**clone** - refers to an individual plant or to all the identical individuals propagated from it by means of cuttings or division.

**crenate** - leaves with undulating, crinkled margins

**crevice plant** - plants that grow well in the narrow gaps left between rockwork. Many have fleshy crowns and need the excellent drainage of such sites. May also refer to plants with small leaves and a creeping habit, these will form attractive ribbons of foliage all along seams in rockwork or in slender gaps between paving stones.

**edging** - plants used for setting off the margins of beds, borders, walkways or drives. Can be low spreading plants if an informal effect is wanted or mid-height evergreen foliage plants if a more defined harder edge is desirable.

floriferous - plants that produce blooms in particular profusion.

gritty - soil with lots of coarse sand or fine gravel providing extra sharp drainage.

**growth habit** - manner in which plants foliage is arranged, many alpines display a low tight cushion growth habit, a common protective adaptation to high wind, crushing snow loads, strong ultraviolet light exposures. Many dryland plants adopt similar growth habits.

**hybrid** - plants resulting from crossbreeding two related species, often produces vigorous plants with larger blooms.

**involute** - leaves with margins turned up, this often creates interesting two-toned effects due to color differences between top and bottom leaf surfaces.

**lean** - soil that is usually very well-drained but also lacking in fertility. In such soils, alpine plants retain their true character of dense, compact growth and often flower much more profusely than when grown in richer soils. Most importantly, alpines tend to be hardier and longer-lived under lean conditions.

**monocarpic** - plants that live and grow for one to several years then die after blooming, many such plants produce prolific quantities of seed thus ensuring a good crop of new plants in succeeding years.

palmate - leaves divided into leaflets & arranged like the fingers of a hand (ie. maple leaves).

**pan** - shallow containers for growing special miniature plants. Like an alpine trough (see below) but generally used for even smaller plants.

**pavement** - areas of horizontal exposed fissured bedrock; alpine plants often colonize the meandering vertical crevices between slabs; these conditions of free drainage & cool root runs can be simulated in the garden using flagstones, patio blocks.

**pinnate** - compound leaves divided into leaflets arranged in parallel rows like the individual fibres along the shaft of a feather (ie. elm, ash, rose leaves).

procumbent - stems that more or less lay flat on the ground.

revolute - leaves with margins turned under, often appearing needle-like.

**scree** - in nature, a sloping area below cliff faces and covered with a shifting layer of broken rock. Artificial screes created in the garden consist of a deep layer of stone chippings or fine gravel laid over a bed of porous, lean soil. Whether made on a slope or on flat ground, these conditions allow the successful culture of many choice alpine plants that would otherwise be sensitive to winter wet or poorly drained soils.

serrate - sharply-toothed margins.

**sharp drainage -** extra porous soil that allows water to drain quickly through. Usually created by adding large quantities of coarse sand or fine gravel to existing soils.

**shrublet** - miniature shrubs, often with a persistent woody base and top shoots that are deciduous and replaced yearly with new growth.

spathulate - spoon-shaped leaves

**trough** - cement, wood or stone planter used to make miniature landscapes of alpine plants. Usually filled with porous soil mix and mulched with chipped stone. When raised to a comfortable working height, these make delightful gardens for the elderly or handicapped while for those with limited room, they offer the opportunity to grow a wide variety of beautiful plants in a small space.

**tufa** - a porous type of limestone rock used for many years in European rock gardens and now becoming popular in North America. It is soft and can be worked with light tools. Many alpine plants will grow on or directly in it. The rock develops a very attractive patina with age while the plants growing in it are naturally dwarfed and maintain extremely compact growth habits.

**xeric plant** - drought-resistant plants that can survive on natural levels of precipitation once established.

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
